## March meeting notes

At our March meeting we were pleased to have Joe Griener of Baron's Orchids in Morro Bay talk to use about "What is an Orchid?" He mentioned that there are over 25,000 orchid registered species that grow in the wild. This makes up about 10% of all the flowering plants in the world. There are also about 150,000 registered hybrids. Most are either epiphytes or lithophytes and are highly adaptable to different environments. They are found on every continent except Antarctica. One species in Australia lives and blooms totally underground. He stated that there are a number of mechanisms that orchids in the wild pollination have to make certain they are pollinated. These include pseudoantagonism, pseudocopulation, fragrance and the promise of food. I thought it was interesting that he mentioned that during the first orchid shows women could not attend as the blooms were considered to erotic. Glad we are not doing that today or we would not have a

show. During hybridization, you get a large number of seeds produced, with each one being genetically unique. With cloning, each plant will be genetically identical. He suggests you watch your orchids for bugs (aphids, mealy bugs, scale and spider mites) and treat with 70% rubbing alcohol right from the bottle. You can either spray it on or put a Q-Tip in the alcohol and then touch the bug with the wet Q-Tip. After the alcohol has dried, spray the bugs off the plant and the water will also rehydrate the plant. You can also use Neem Oil and as a last resort use a systemic insecticide. If you see ants near you plants they might be carrying the bugs around to you need to

stop them He suggests putting a solution of boric acid and sugar water near where the ants are and they will take it back to the colony and the liquid will poison the other ants plus the queen of the colony. Only make a solution with about 10% boric acid because if it is too strong, the any will die before it gets back to the colony.

Orchid seeds are very light and can easily blow around in the wild. But, very few will germinate and survive in the wild. The orchid seed needs to gets all its nourishment from the surrounding environment.
